User Guide

There are activities for **PRIMARY, MIDDLE** and **SECONDARY** students, three activities per level. Each set includes:

- Getting ready! a warm-up activity to get students excited for their visit to the MALTA BOOK FESTIVAL.
- At the Malta Book Festival! something fun and interactive to do while you're there.
- After the Malta Book Festival a follow-up activity to keep the inspiration alive.

You can choose to do just one, two, or all three—it's completely up to you! Each activity is organised into clear sections:

A quick look at the learning goals, including the skills students will develop.

What We'll Do

An outline of the task—what both students and educators will be doing.

What We'll Need

A list of the materials required.

Step-by-step instructions, prompts, and an estimated time to complete the task.

Book Cover Sorting Game

Let's play a game with **BOOK COVERS!** We'll look at several book covers and put them into groups.

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Develop visual literacy by noticing and interpreting book covers.
- Practice speaking through observation, discussion and explanation.
- Build awareness of genre and themes (e.g. animals, space).
- Make personal connections to books and build excitement for reading.
- Strengthen group work and decisionmaking skills.

REMEMBER!

You will get a BOOK VOUCHER to spend on books at the MALTA BOOK FESTIVAL!

What we'll do:

- Look SUPER CLOSELY at book covers.
- Talk about what we SEE and THINK.
- · Think about what books we LIKE.
- HAVE FUN with books!

What we need:

- 8 TO 12 BOOK COVERS, printed or on a screen. The more colourful and varied, the better.
 Select book covers that reflect a range of topics and age levels.
 - o If printing them in colour do so in large format for easy visibility.
 - o TIP: Choose familiar titles to boost confidence.
- Set up a LARGE SURFACE (floor, carpet or table) for sorting.
- SORTING CARDS (for example):
 - o Fiction / Non-fiction
 - o Animals / Space / Art
 - o Funny / Scary stories
 - o Books for little children
 - o Books for older children

Warm-up discussion

(5-10 minutes)

- a. Show one book cover and ask prompting questions such as:
 - i. What do you see?
 - ii. What do you think this book is about?
 - iii. Would you like to read this book?

Sorting together

(15-20 minutes)

- a. Hold up a cover and let children describe it.
- b. Decide where to put the book.
- c. Allow time for discussion and debate.
- d. Place the book in the chosen category.
- e. Repeat with each cover.

Sorting the first book

(5 minutes)

- a. Show the sorting cards and explain to the children that you are going to place the cover in one of the groups.
 - i. Is it about animals?
 - ii. Does it look like a book for older children or little children?
 - iii. Can you put this book in more than one group?
- b. Place it in a group.

Group discussion

(5 minutes)

- a. Ask the children to explain their choices in simple words.
- b. Other prompts you may use:
 - i. Which group had the most books?
 - ii. Did any covers surprise you?
 - iii. Which book would you like to read next?


BONUS IDEAS:

- Let children make their own BOOK COVER and sort it into a group.
- Play a **GUESSING GAME**: Which book would you read at bedtime?
- Make a CLASS BOOK WALL: Display all sorted covers on a bulletin board with labels.





Book Safari: My Book Festival Adventure!

Grab your **BOOK VOUCHERS** and join the adventure at the **MALTA BOOK FESTIVAL!** Like explorers in the wild, we'll be looking for the most exciting, curious books that we can find!

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Develop early book awareness and explore different types of books.
- Practice speaking and storytelling through simple presentations.
- Build confidence and engagement with books and reading spaces.
- Strengthen social interaction, observation, and memory recall skills.

What we'll do:

- EXPLORE as many book stands as we can at the MALTA BOOK FESTIVAL.
- Use the BOOK VOUCHERS to buy INTERESTING and FUN books!
- Snap a GROUP PHOTO of everyone proudly holding the books!
- Use the BOOK SAFARI CHECK SHEET to see how many different types of books we chose.

What we need:

- MOBILE PHONE or CAMERA. This should be used by the educator/s to take photos. (Be mindful of data protection when taking photos!)
- BOOK SAFARI CHECK SHEET (overleaf)

LET'S START!

- Visit as many book stands as you can. Help children to approach the stands respectfully and safely.
- 2. At each stand, help the children choose a book that genuinely interests them. Encourage them to focus on the content, not the size of the book or what others are picking.
- 3. Capture a fun group photo with everyone proudly showing off the books they picked!
- 4. Use the **BOOK SAFARI CHECK SHEET** to identify the different types and genres of books the children selected.

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Develop early book awareness and explore different types of books.
- Practice speaking and listening skills through simple presentations.
- Strengthen social interaction, observation and memory recall skills.

What we'll do:

- RECALL and DESCRIBE our BOOK SAFARI experience.
- IDENTIFY books we explored or enjoyed.
- TALK to the class about a book you bought with the BOOK VOUCHER.

What we need:

- Printed / digital BOOK SAFARI PHOTO on a screen
- · CHART/S
- Drawing materials like CRAYONS or MARKERS
- MY BOOK SAFARI MEMORY sheet (overleaf)

LET'S START!


- 1. **Warm-up discussion / Circle time.** (5-10 minutes)
 - Who had fun on the BOOK SAFARI?
 - Who remembers one book they saw at the festival?
 - · What was your favourite stand? Why?
- 2. Show the class photo from the trip. (20-30 minutes)
 - Each student (or group of students) says
 1–2 sentences about the book they bought.

- 3. Distribute the **MY BOOK SAFARI MEMORY** drawing sheet. (10–15 minutes)
 - Children draw a picture of themselves with the book they liked the most. Ask them to complete a short sentence: "I liked this book because..."
- 4. **Wrap-up** (5 minutes)
 - Group photo with the children showing off their drawings.

The Book Personality Quiz!

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Develop self-awareness as readers by identifying personal interests and preferences.
- Build understanding of different book genres and their key characteristics.

BONUS IDEAS:

- BLIND BOOK TASTING:
 - Wrap books in brown paper with only the first sentence of the book written on the front. Let students choose a book based on the sentence.
- BOOK MOOD BOARD:
 - Students make a collage of images, quotes and colours that match their favourite type of book or story.
- BOOK CHARACTER
 MATCH-UP:

Students match characters from different genres to themselves or each other – who's most like Katniss Everdeen or Percy Jackson?

What we need:

- Copies of the BOOK PERSONALITY QUIZ (overleaf)
- PENCILS or PENS
- A WHITEBOARD or CHART (optional, for group results or discussion)
- A selection of **BOOKS** from each personality category (optional)

What we'll do:

- Take a fun and easy personality quiz with questions about our LIKES, DISLIKES and FAVOURITE THINGS.
- Find out our BOOK PERSONALITY.
- SHARE and COMPARE results with your friends you might even find your book twin!

LET'S START!

- Hand out the quiz to each student.
- Give everyone 10-15 minutes to answer the questions.
- 3. Match their answers to a **BOOK PERSONALITY**:
 - a. The Real-life Explorer
 - b. The Fantasy Dreamer
 - c. The Mystery Solver

- d. The Laugh-Out-Louder
- e. The Thrill Seeker
- Reveal each student's result and offer book suggestions based on their type.
- Encourage them to swap suggestions with classmates for even more ideas!

Book Recommendations

Find your next FAVOURITE READ – from you and your mates! You can RECOMMEND BOOKS to your friends and vice versa!

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Build awareness of different book genres and types.
- Develop the ability to recommend books by reflecting on personal reading preferences.
- Encourage venturing beyond one's reading comfort zone.

What we need:

- PENCILS or PENS
- MINI RECOMMENDATION CARD (overleaf)
- CLASS READING LIST (overleaf)
- CHART

What we'll do:

- Fill out a MINI RECOMMENDATION CARD.
- **SWAP** cards with friends.
- Create a CLASS READING LIST based on these recommendations.
- DISPLAY the CLASS READING LIST or the MINI RECOMMENDATION CARDS on a wall or table.

LET'S START!

- 1. **Warm-up discussion** (5-10 minutes)
 - a. What was the most interesting book you came across at the Malta Book Festival?
 - b. Have you found a book that matches your **BOOK PERSONALITY**?
 - c. Have you ever picked up a book that you didn't think you'd like but ended up loving? What was it?
- 2. Hand out the MINI

- **RECOMMENDATION CARDS**. Students fill them in. (10 minutes)
- 3. Students swap their cards with those of their friends and discuss their choices. (10–15 minutes)
- 4. The educator collects the cards and creates a CLASS READING LIST based on them. The cards and the list can be displayed on a RECOMMENDATION WALL or table.

BONUS IDEAS:

- **GUESS THE GENRE**: Read out book blurbs (no titles!) and let others guess the genre or Book Personality match.
- **BOOKMARK SWAP:** Write a favourite book quote on a blank bookmark and exchange with someone else.



Judge a Book by its Cover

This activity is all about first impressions, instincts and curiosity. Can you guess a story's plot, tone or genre just by looking at its cover?

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Develop visual literacy by analysing cover design, typography and layout
- Become aware of how marketing influences reader expectations
- Practice inference skills using visual and written cues.

What we need:

- SIX PRINTOUTS or DIGITAL IMAGES of book covers without title.
- A second version with the titles and blurbs revealed
- PENCIL or PEN
- BOOK COVER CARD (overleaf)

What we'll do:

- Look at a SELECTION OF BOOK COVERS without reading the titles or blurbs.
- Write down and discuss what you **THINK** the book is about – genre, mood, characters, etc.
- REVEAL THE BLURB OR ACTUAL STORY SUMMARY and compare your ideas.
- Vote for your FAVOURITE cover and your most MISLEADING one!

LET'S START!

- 1. Reveal a book cover.
- 2. Write your guess on the **BOOK COVER CARD** (2 minutes)
 - a. What genre is it?
 - b. Who might the main character be?
 - c. Is this book for children or adults? Why?
 - d. Why did they use these colours and fonts?
- 3. Reveal the title of the book and read the blurb.
- 4. Discuss your reaction with a partner or a group (5 minutes).
 - a. Was your guess close?
 - b. Did the cover trick you or hook you?
- 5. Repeat with the rest of the covers.
- 6. Vote for the class' favourite cover and the most misleading one.



If This Were My Book...

Ever seen a book cover that sparked your imagination with ideas only to find that it was totally different? In this activity, you'll come up with your own story using just the cover!

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Read visual clues from book covers genre, audience, mood and plot.
- Think like a writer or illustrator.
- How to build on our own ideas from a single image.

What we'll do:

- Look around at book stands at the MALTA BOOK FESTIVAL
- Choose a cover that grabs our attention.
- Ask ourselves:
- a. What do the images and colours suggest?
- b. Who do I think this book is for?
- c. What's the genre?

What we need:

- PENCILS or PENS
- WORKSHEET (overleaf)

TIP!

You can use your **BOOK VOUCHER** to buy this book (and others!).


LET'S START!

- 1. Have a look around the book stands and choose a cover that jumps at you.
- 2. Imagine the world behind the cover. Is it a dragon school? A haunted bakery? A robot love story?
- 3. Next, read the blurb to know what it's about.
- 4. Now, come up with your own alternate story based on the book cover and the blurb.
- 5. On the worksheet, finish the following sentence: *If* this were my book, it would be about...
- 6. Write a short paragraph with your version of what this book is about.

Blurb It!

You know that little teaser on the back of a book? That's the blurb! Pick a book and write your own blurb.

What we'll learn:

This activity will help us to:

- Summarise a story in a few powerful sentences.
- Use mystery, emotion and excitement to grab a reader's attention.
- Write in a voice that matches the book's style and genre.

What we'll do:

- Think about one of our favourite books.
 It could be one that we saw at the MALTA
 BOOK FESTIVAL, or that we bought with the
 BOOK VOUCHER
- Write a 3–5 sentence blurb that would go on the back cover.
- Share our blurb with the class. Would they pick up the book based on our blurb?

What we need:

- PENCILS or PENS
- A copy or image of the book we're writing about
- BLURB SHEET (overleaf)

BONUS IDEAS

BLURB SWAP: Write a silly blurb for a well-known book and see whether your classmates can guess the book.

BOOK TRAILER: Turn your blurb into a 30-second movie trailer pitch, live or recorded.

LET'S START!

- 1. Look intently at the book cover.
 - a. What attracts you about the cover?
 - b. What can you infer about the story from the title of the book?
- 2. Write a 3-5 sentence blurb (5 minutes). Include:
 - a. A sense of the main character or setting.
 - b. The problem or mystery without giving it away.
 - c. A hook that makes someone want to read more.
- 3. Share your blurb with the rest of the class. (2–3 minutes)
